MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF



This year was really two different experiences. The first six months was marked by the employment of Officer Valerie Stewart and Officer Melvin Norrington Jr. who represented one of the few times our department has been at the full staffing level of 40 sworn officers. This also represented the achievement of one of my personal goals for my employment tenure as Chief of Police. The second six months was the

beginning of a hiring freeze that left the staffing level at 38 sworn with the departure of two police officers.

During this year, the vacancies created by the retirement of Major Dave Huskisson on April 1st, were filled after the promotional process by the promotion of Sergeant Kevin Freeman to the rank of Major, and Officer Pat Romine to the rank of Sergeant. These will become effective on January 7, 2011 as the new year's schedule is implemented.

The Administrative Sergeant concept continued during 2010, with Sgt. Dan Justus serving in that role. Sgt. Mark Smith will assume the assignment in January of 2011. He will also be a member of the inaugural class of the Missouri Police Chiefs Charitable Foundation Command College. This is a program near and dear to my heart as I began working on its development with our Association's Executive Director, Sheldon Lineback, several years prior, when I was the president. The realization of this goal is most satisfying, and having a member of our police department in the inaugural class makes it even that much better.

In July, the City Council approved the purchase of a radio system to replace our aging system that had become obsolete both in the availability of replacement parts, and the ability to communicate at federally mandated interoperability standards. It is anticipated that the new system will become operational during 2011, becoming fully operational by December. This equipment will provide communication between a number of public safety and governmental organizations within the MidAmerica Regional Council area of two states and eight counties. The regional system links the three systems owned by the City of Independence, Missouri, City of Kansas City, Missouri and Johnson County, Kansas, capitalizing shared resources that will provide cost savings to regional partners. The system, as it is designed, will meet the mandated federal requirements for interoperable communications ahead of the target date. As a result North Kansas City's first responders will be able to communicate with other agencies involved in large scale Incident Command events by switching existing radio equipment to

designated emergency "Talk Groups". Major Jess McLendon has been instrumental in the entire process, and continues to lead the way during the acquisition and installation of the new system.

2010 represented continued development of the Citizens Emergency Response Team (CERT). Officer Rob Russell and Detective James Ham have devoted themselves to this project both on duty and off. Both earned their Bachelor of Science degrees in Emergency Management. They began efforts to create a Community Emergency Response Team for NKC, and to bring that team on line with teams already developed in Clay County, Platte County, Gladstone, Liberty and Smithville. Both members, and Officer Mike McNamee, attended a standard CERT training class, followed by attendance at a CERT Train-the-Trainer class in order to become CERT Instructors. We held our first CERT training class in November of 2010, training 17 students with 9 of these students/volunteers officially becoming NKC CERT team members. Rob Russell and James Ham attended the 2010 International Association of Emergency Manager's (IAEM) Conference in October 2010. Attendance at this conference served as a forum to attain eventual certification for both Rob and Jim as Certified Emergency Manager's (CEM).

After years of decline in the overall crime rate, we began to edge up with the rest of the country with a 13.73% overall increase. This must be considered in context as the crime rate was down 44.65% between 2007 and 2009. Even with the increase, it is still 33% below the 2007 crime rate.

This year we continued to participate in traffic grants from the Federal Government that paid for overtime pay for officers working the streets, focusing on hazardous moving violations and drunk driving. Also this year, we began participating in a program with the acronym EUDL which stands for Enforcement of Under-aged Drinking Laws. This is a combination of educational opportunities for establishments that serve alcohol and enforcement of the laws that govern those businesses. Our goal is to reduce the occurrence of under-aged persons being able to obtain alcohol within the City of North Kansas City. It is our desire to make this number zero, however, we remain practical and realize the need for continued investigation and enforcement.

As I have said on a number of occasions, it is truly my pleasure to work with this committed group that makes up the North Kansas City Police Department, and our honor to serve our public.



DEPARTMENT STRUCTURE



The North Kansas City Police Department is staffed with 39 sworn officers, 2 reserve officers and 16 civilians, for a total employee roster of 57.

The current average length of service for sworn and civilian full-time employees is 11.3 years.

DEPARTMENT TRAINING

The Missouri Department of Public Safety requires that each licensed police officer continue their education while they are with a police department. The Peace Officer Standards and Training (P.O.S.T.) Commission is an agency designed to oversee the licensing of police officers and reserve officers. The Commission controls the basic training instructors, curriculum, and training centers.

SWORN OFFICERS AND RESERVE OFFICERS:

Must successfully complete a minimum of forty-eight (48) hours of continuing education, within a three-year cycle, to maintain their police officer license. Each officer shall complete a minimum of four (4) hours in all four (4) core curricula areas. The core curricula areas are identified as:

1. Legal Studies - Training focuses on updates or familiarization concerning federal, state and local criminal law or legal issues.
2. Interpersonal Perspectives - Training focuses on communication skills such as cultural diversity training, ethics, conflict management, victim sensitivity and stress management.

3. Technical Studies - Training focuses on specialized studies or activities which directly relate to the job description, including first aid and CPR training.

4. Skill Development- Training focuses on activities that develop physical skill proficiency such as defensive tactics, firearms driver training, first aid and CPR training. A minimum of four (4) hours of some type of Firearms Skill Development training must be completed during each three (3) year reporting period.

COMMUNICATION OFFICERS:

The State of Missouri requires that all Communication Officers receive twelve (12) hours of mandatory state training hours within a year. Every two years, the Communication Officers have to be re-certified for ALERT/MULES/NCIC.

CIVILIANS:

The civilian employees attain training to maintain knowledge in new technology that is useful for the department and to keep abreast of mandates regarding criminal history information and its dissemination.

CERTIFICATE OF COMMENDATION

Detective James Ham

On December 12, 2006, two suspects entered the Missouri Poster building in North Kansas City. These suspects physically controlled the owner and his significant other, who routinely used the business as their residence. One of the suspects severely beat the owner, leaving him with potentially life threatening injuries. A number of items were stolen from the building, with most being returned within a short time.

To say that this crime had a number of serious idiosyncrasies, would be an incredible understatement. The experienced investigator would clearly register the clearance of this case a "long shot" at best. There was not a great deal of physical evidence at the scene, and almost no significant leads in the case.

This case was assigned to Detective Ham, who never let up. Through all of the adversities from a variety of sources, Detective Ham stayed focused on solving this case. His performance was nothing short of amazing. Many people, thought this case was on a direct route to become a "cold case", but Detective Ham stayed with it. Because of his work, which included enormous support from Major Huskisson, Detective Hein, and Detective Baker, three suspects were identified.

On March 4, 2010 one suspect pled guilty and will be sentenced in the near future to not less than 20, nor more than 28 years in prison. The other two suspects in the case are both in custody, with their particular fates yet to be seen. Because of his exceptional act of police duty which has brought credit to Detective Ham, and the North Kansas City Police Department, he is awarded the Certification of Commendation

RECOGNITION FOR ACHIEVEMENT

On March 1, 2010, at approximately 1322 hours, an otherwise pretty calm day in North Kansas City was interrupted by a man stabbing his wife several times, then attempting to flee northbound on Vernon from the 2300 block. Fortunately, Officer Kimmel was observing traffic at that very location and was also advised by a citizen that the suspect had just stabbed his wife. Officer Kimmel is to especially be recognized for his extremely calm demeanor as he called out the incident, specific suspect information, including the direction of travel, and the ultimate location, the North Kansas City Hospital Emergency Room.

The entire crew moved into action in a very professional manner. In my opinion, it was as though we handled calls like this everyday, which we obviously do not. The officers at the scene worked to stabilize both the victim and the crime scene, securing the identity of potential witness, and evidence. The officers and detectives at the emergency room did an excellent job of securing the suspect and obtaining evidence, while not interfering with the medical treatment of either the suspect or the victim.

I am very impressed with the way each of you performed your duty on this incident. It is a great comfort to me to see our officers and dispatchers respond so quickly and efficiently to emergencies such as this. It is truly a pleasure to serve the citizens of North Kansas City with each of you.

OVERTIME AND SICK LEAVE

Department overtime in 2010 increased 14.21% over 2009, with a total of 4366.54 overtime hours. The increase is attributed to coverage for an increased rate of FMLA sick leave and overtime accrued during an Operation 100 assist to Gladstone Public Safety.

Total sick time hours for 2010 was 3290.41, a 50.43% increase over 2187.35 hours of sick time in 2009. However, 1704 hours, or 52% of total sick time, is attributed to FMLA leave accrued in 2010.

PATROL DIVISION

The Patrol Division includes the Patrol Unit, the COPPS Unit and the Tactical Team.

The Patrol Division is staffed by officers assigned to deliver traditional immediate police emergency response, as well as to initiate more involved criminal investigations. North Kansas City patrol officers are the backbone of visible policing in our community. These are the men and women that are on constant vigil to provide emergency services around the clock, every single day of the year.

The Patrol Unit issued a total of 3,571 Uniform Traffic Tickets (UTT) and General Ordinance Summonses (GOS) in 2010, not inclusive of parking violations. This is an 15.75% decrease from 4,239 tickets issued in 2009.

COPPS

The **COPPS Unit** (Community Oriented Policing and Problem Solving) provides a critical link for our crime prevention programs for the public and our business community, such as Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED), the Safe Residence Program and Crime Free Multi-Housing. 2010 also marks the founding year of the North Kansas CERT program (Community Emergency Response Team). The three officers assigned to this unit have received many hours of specialized training designed to enhance the problem solving aspect of the police department.

COPPS Officers, Robert Masterson, Robert Russell and Brian Lawrence represent the core of the police response to problems within the neighborhoods. The response to long term problems often involve collaboration with a variety of community and neighborhood groups. The COPPS Unit also assists other officers by providing follow-

up on recurring problems to ensure the solution remains in place and continues to be relevant.

While responding to short-term problems, these officers may be seen riding bikes or ATV's through parks, business areas and neighborhoods throughout North Kansas City. The resurrection of bicycle patrol has been a great success for Officer Lawrence in fostering a positive relationship with the community as a whole.



The **Safe Residence Program**, implemented in the latter part of 2009 and developed to protect and improve North Kansas City's rental community, continued to grow through 2010 and now has over 40 landlords and 206 rental units enrolled in the program.

The **CPTED** program, or Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design, is available for both residential and

business addresses. CPTED is a proactive crime fighting technique in which proper design and effective use of the built environment can lead to a reduction of crime, improving the quality of life. The COPPS unit provides surveys of property to determine changes that can make the home or business less susceptible to crime. CERT

The North Kansas City Police is pleased to introduce the newly formed Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). **CERT** training promotes a partnering effort between emergency services and the people that they serve. The goal is for emergency personnel to train members of neighborhoods, community organizations, or workplaces in basic response skills. **CERT** members are then integrated into the emergency response capability for their area.



CERT members maintain and refine their skills by participating in exercises and activities. They can attend supplemental training opportunities offered by the sponsoring agency and others that further their skills base. Finally, **CERT** members can volunteer for projects that improve community emergency preparedness.

SRO

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER, Michael McNamee, in his seventh year of working on site at the North Kansas City High School, is available on a full-time basis to assist students with concerns they may have associated with everyday life, family problems, problems with the law, and academic problems. This proactive approach to community/police relations continues to have a positive effect on forming partnerships with the community.

The high school currently maintains eight security personnel, a permanently assigned Clay County Deputy and a rotating position of another deputy on a daily basis. In addition, there are five full-time trained civilian personnel that monitor the open doors and respond to school type situations, as opposed to providing law enforcement services. Video cameras, installed over summer break, also assists in clearing up student conduct issues, as well as criminal activity.

Student arrests are trending downward with an 11% decrease through December of the 2010-2011 year compared to December 31st of the the 2009-2010 year. In addition, student arrests reflect a 38% decrease from December 31st of the 2008-2009 school year to December 31st of the 2010-2011 school year.

Officer McNamee continues to educate students and faculty on subjects of domestic violence, prescription drug abuse, date rape, community emergency response and a variety of other law enforcement topics.

SUPPORT SERVICES DIVISION

The **Support Services Division** encompasses the Communications, Records, Animal Control and Parking Control Units. In addition, the Support Services Division provides administrative and support functions to the police department, to include recruitment, computer operations, budget, purchasing and accounts payable.

COMMUNICATIONS

The Communications Unit provides continuous telephone and radio contact with officers while coordinating all police, fire and ambulance responses within the city. Computer Aided

Dispatching (CAD) software is used to process calls and track information crucial to each call.

Communication Officers must be able to not only answer and disseminate these calls for assistance, but they do so as they also monitor multiple radio frequencies, broadcast calls, run records information, track officer's activity in the field to monitor their safety, and maintain our computerized record management system. The Communication Officers often encounter irate, frustrated, and frightened citizens needing urgent help. During emergencies, these employees must remain calm and efficiently handle their duties.

The North Kansas City Communications Center is currently staffed by one Supervisor, nine full-time Communication Officers and one part-time Communication Officer. This unit is a vital link between citizens and emergency services. Each Communication Officer must maintain yearly recertification on the ALERT computer system and recertification every three years on the MULES computer system.

Total calls received through dispatch in 2010 was 48,206, down 6% from 51,245 calls in 2009. 9,544, or 20% of total calls received in 2010, were 911 calls. This is a 5% increase from 9,083 911 calls received in 2009.

Any phone call received or party reporting in person that requires response from a police officer is classified as a CAD incident.

There were 18,494 CAD incidents in 2010, down 8.5% from 20,202 in 2009. Total radio transmissions in 2010 was 169,482, a 19.6% decrease over 210,763 radio transmissions in 2009.

Communications personnel also assist in the documentation of booking procedures, processing detainees and coordinating transportation/bonding with our housing agents.

The North Kansas City Police Department had a total of 2,350 arrests in 2010, down from 2,839 arrests in 2009, for a 13% decrease. 71% of total arrests were due to outstanding North Kansas City warrants and outside agency warrants. General Order Summonses and Uniform Traffic Tickets accounted for 22% of arrests made in 2010.

ANIMAL CONTROL

Animal Control is responsible for enforcing all City codes related to the ownership and care of domestic animals, as well as responding to all animal related calls for service.

The North Kansas City Animal Control Unit has two full-time employees and one part-time shelter attendant. There is an animal control officer available seven days a week. The shelter is open 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday.

Animal Control received 3,666 calls in 2010. Citations decreased from 27 in 2009 to 14 in 2010.

INVESTIGATION DIVISION

The responsibility of the **Investigation Division** is to clear assigned crimes through thorough investigation of all leads. An assigned crime is considered cleared when either charges are brought or the case is unfounded. Additionally, the Investigation Unit is responsible for monitoring criminal activity and forwarding pertinent information to other agencies. The Investigation Division and the Patrol Division interact to determine crime trends and develop strategies to counteract criminal activity.

Total Crimes Against Persons increased 38% over 2009 totals with 34 reported incidents in 2010, compared to 21 reported incidents in 2009. The 2010 clearance rate for Crimes Against Persons is 52.9%

Total Property Crimes increased 10% with 347 reported incidents in 2010, compared to 314 reported incidents in 2009. 2010 clearance rate for Property Crimes was 20.7%. Clearance rate on all 2010 Part 1 Crimes is 23.6%

While the crime rates for total Part 1 Crimes increased 13.73% over 2009 statistics, crime in North Kansas City is down 39.43% from 2006 and has decreased consistently for four of the last five years.

TRAFFIC UNIT

The **Traffic Unit** is dedicated to improving and promoting traffic safety through analysis, education, prevention, and enforcement.

Annually, federal funds are made available through the US Department of Transportation to promote traffic safety on our roadways. Our goals are to reduce motor vehicle crashes, fatalities and injuries, increase the use of occupant protection devices and reduce impaired driving.

Crashes were up 4.47% from 2009 totals. DWI arrests reflected a dramatic decrease, dropping from 114 in 2009 to 63 in 2010, a 44.74% reduction. This is the first decrease in annual DWI totals since 2007 with DWI arrests showing substantial incline during 2008 and 2009.
