NKC Citizens Academy

2023 was the second year of the Citizens Academy, a program that allows residents to learn how their local government works, and how to get involved as a board or commission member. This 9-week program aims to train and inspire future leaders in our community. Two current Councilmembers are graduates of Citizens Academy!

NKC School District Partnership

North Kansas City was excited to be part of the inaugural class of the school district's mentorship program. This fantastic opportunity allows business leaders to become mentors for High School Juniors. Honorary Streets

In honor of Taylor Swift's Eras Tour Stop in Kansas City, the city honorarily renamed two streets on the southwest corner of



Armour Rd, one being "Swift Street (Taylor's Version)" and the other temporarily named "Cornelia Street." Thousands of "Swifties" came to NKC to take photos with the signs, and many visited some of our local downtown businesses.

A Reimagined Budget Workshop

Over the last few years, the City has reconfigured the budgeting process to involve more public participation earlier in the process. This year was the first Bounce and Balance event, where the budget process was taken outside City Hall's walls. This event was a success, and we look forward to making next year's even bigger!





YEAR IN REVIEW

2023 has been an interesting year for North Kansas City! Here are just a few of the highlights of City activity last year.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The Community Development Department continues to promote growth and development across our community. This year, under the City's economic development policy, significant investments in the rehabilitation and maintenance of the present housing stock have been observed, as well as new housing, commercial, and industrial projects. The Neighborhood Services division has seen an 88% increase in rental inspections this year, further ensuring that all homes in North Kansas City offer a safe living environment for NKC residents. Besides the increasing population, the City has continued to invest in capital improvements that promote a multi-modal transportation network for all.

HOWELL STREET SHARED USE PATH

Street. Attractions to
non-motorized users
of this area include

several community assets and open spaces, such as the North Kansas City City Hall, North Kansas City Public Library, North Kansas City High School, and Macken Park. The ultimate vision for Howell Street between 32nd Avenue and Armour is a neighborhood connector that is safe, serves all users, incorporates sustainable measures, and is visually appealing.



RIVERFRONT LEVEE TRAIL FEASIBILITY STUDY

North Kansas City is continuing to implement our 2020 Bicycle Master Plan with the launch of the North Kansas City Levee Trail Study. Trail connections along the Missouri River were the most strongly supported projects by public input during our Bicycle Master Planning Process.

This study is largely funded by another Planning Sustainable Places (PSP) grant from MARC and will assess the feasibility of multi-modal trail along the southern portion of our levee system taking into account potential barriers, restrictions, safety, and operations of the levee.

The potential trail would begin near the Heart of America Bridge at the Kansas City, Mo., border and extend eastward along the levee before heading north towards Armour Road at Walker Road, and branch eastward at Riverboat Drive toward the Chouteau Bridge.

2023 YEAR IN REVIEW

In 2023, North Kansas City Fire Department continued to move forward, amassing over 15,000 training hours and responding to over 2,500 emergency requests and transported over 1,600 patients. We had the pleasure of hiring Three new FF/EMTs, and two members successfully completed paramedic school and became licensed paramedics. We had one member retire this year after 30 years of service.

Safety is always a priority and NKCFD provides its various services and programs to support a safe community for the residents, businesses, and visitors to the city. Some of those services include "hands only CPR," certified CPR training, "Stop the Bleed", and fire extinguisher training. The Department has also established a close working relationship with the North Kansas City School District's CAPS Program and Career Development. We were also honored to host a session of the NKC Citizens Academy allowing persons from all walks of life to get some firsthand experience with the tools and equipment we use daily.



With constant new developments changing the landscape and skyline of North Kansas City, the Fire Department is also looking into the future to forecast additional personnel, training, and equipment needs required to provide the residents, businesses, and visitors with the most effective services available. We are also looking forward to celebrating our Departments 100-year anniversary in 2024. Your trust, support, and partnership have been the bedrock upon which we've built our legacy of service. We look forward to celebrating this milestone with you and continuing to forge an even stronger bond in the years to come.

We are proud to be your fire department and stand ready to serve you anytime.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

In 2023, there was an increase in reported cases of property damage by 11%, attempted auto theft by 20%, auto theft by 33%, and traffic crashes by 17%. However, the police department noted a decrease in stealing by 18%, assaults by 2%, and catalytic converter thefts by 88%. The officers are committed to deterring and apprehending criminals in North Kansas City through various patrol operations. If you want to learn about crime prevention tips or strategies, you can contact the COPPS unit.

The communications unit welcomed two new faces in 2023, who are currently in training and will soon be assigned to a shift. The animal shelter also has a new part-time employee who has completed their training and assists animal control officers with their daily duties.

Several employees were recognized for exceptional performance in the line of duty. Sergeant Hubbell, K-9 Officer Ward, and K-9 Officer Pickering were recognized by the Kansas City Missouri Police Department for assisting with the unfortunate passing of a KCMOPD K-9 Officer and his Police K-9. Major Smith, Sergeant Justus, Sergeant Holm, Officer Josephson, Officer Silver, Officer

Harmon, Officer Smith, Officer Ficken, Detective Kahler, Detective Friedel, and Civilian Adamek received a special unit citation for their actions during a domestic violence situation.

Several members of the department traveled to Jefferson City and Washington D.C. in May to honor Officer Daniel Vasquez when his name was placed on both the State memorial and the National memorial honoring Police Officers who have sacrificed their lives protecting their communities. A local memorial is in the



design and pre-construction stage that will honor all Police, Fire, and Emergency Medical, that have died serving the community of North Kansas City.

The North Kansas City Police Department expresses its gratitude and pride to the community for their support and partnership in keeping North Kansas City safe.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT



2023 was an eventful year for Public Works! Beyond the daily responsibilities of leaf pick up, snow removal, mowing, patching potholes, street sweeping, garbage pickup, tree limbs down, planting flower beds, decorating for the seasons, and overseeing many construction projects, we were able to make some big improvements in the city.

The tree planting and tree maintenance budgets were increased to provide residents with a more robust tree program. The city currently maintains nearly 3000 trees in its tree canopy. Due to the large number of trees requiring continual maintenance, Municipal Services staff and outside contractors work together to provide tree planting, pruning, and removal.

The multi-year renovation of the Water Treatment Plant facilities has been substantially completed. The project

set out to address legacy pollution issue in the Missouri River aquifer and also included the rehabilitation of the structural, mechanical, and electrical facilities and structures. Improvements were made to the building, and two new wells, a new electrical system, new control system/SCADA improvements, new instrumentation, new HVAC systems, new chemical/electrical building, new high service pumps and piping, new filter valves and actuators, and a new chlorine storage and feed building were added.



Considerable progress was made on the on-going project to improve roadway curbs, public sidewalks, and storm drainage structures. ADA curb ramp improvements are a large part of this project. Most of these improvements have been constructed by the current on-call concrete contractor.

WATER MASTER PLAN


Working with local engineering firm, McClure Engineering, the purpose of this project is to provide the City with an action-oriented Water Master Plan that allows for robust public input, detailed water system assessment and analysis, and sound recommendations for both capital projects and policy/procedure updates that fit with the City's vision for water distribution management. The design professional will develop a prioritized 10-year capital improvements plan for the water system.

STORMWATER MASTER PLAN

Working with local engineering firm Olsson, the goal of this plan is to provide a comprehensive review and analysis of the existing stormwater system, recommend improvements to ensure current and future demands are met, provide a sustainable best management practice for operations and maintenance, and provide a framework for integrating new development into the system. The plan will provide detailed information about where the critical repairs in the City's infrastructure.

SANITARY MASTER PLAN

The city has hired consulting firm Veenstra & Kimm to develop a comprehensive evaluation and management plan for the NKC sanitary sewer system. The goals of this plan will include analysis of the performance capability of the existing infrastructure, recommendations for improvements/maintenance, recommendations for policy revisions and implementation, and identifying and developing recommended improvement projects.



PARKS & RECREATION

This past year has been very exciting and busy. Probably our greatest triumph was the passing of Proposition P, the Parks Sales Tax, approved by over 80% of the voters to increase the sales tax by a 1/4 of a cent to be used for parks, recreational programming, and community events.

Our second biggest accomplishment was setting a Guinness World Record for the longest baseball game -100 hours and 1 minute. The Endless Game happened over Labor Day weekend and was played by 60 players who had to stay in the park the entire time. The game started at 8 a.m. on Thursday and finished at 12:01 p.m. on Monday.

Our 7th annual Arts in the Park Festival expanded its footprint by adding more artists, a kid's zone, a second stage to facilitate alternating musical acts, and a robust Youth Art & Entrepreneurship program.

Music at Macken was bountiful this summer with Friday Night Concerts that featured local talent as openers, Ken Remmert's Friday in the Park celebrated its 45th year of free live entertainment over the lunch hour on Fridays, and the KC Symphony did a free concert out of their Mobile Music Box. And if that wasn't enough, we also held a two-day music festival partnering with the BBPA on Briar Fest 8. The festival featured 2 stages, 26 bands, a hot air balloon glow, vendors, food trucks, an art and wine oasis, a beer forest, and fun.

Waggin' Trail Dog Park hosted its annual Boneanza and Howl-O-Ween events, and in October our Trunk or Treat got moved inside due to rainy weather, but it was still a huge success with almost 1000 people attending.

Our Enrichment offerings continue to grow. We have a robust homeschool program, cooking classes for kids and adults, art classes, camps, youth soccer, bitty soccer, bitty basketball, as well as Men and Coed softball leagues. Our Encore programs offer socials, luncheons, games, fitness classes, and day trips for active older adults.

The 3rd weekend of November at the Park Center was our Mistletowne Market, a small, curated artisan holiday market. After Thanksgiving, we placed donated hats, scarves, and gloves on the fence lines for anyone needing a little extra warmth moving into the winter season.



Our Mayor's Tree Lighting Ceremony moved to a new location on the southwest corner of Armour Road and Swift, to include Santa and his elves, reindeer pony rides, music, crafts, cocoa, and cookies.



The Armour Road Complete Street Project was conceived with a vision to create a safer, more accessible, and aesthetically pleasing environment for all residents and visitors. By adopting a "complete streets" approach, the project strives to accommodate the diverse needs of the community, promoting not only vehicular traffic but also walking, cycling, and public transit.

The City was proud to cut the ribbon on the final phase of the Armour Road Complete Street project in April. Improvements included intersection and crosswalk improvements, beautification, and increased safety for pedestrians and cyclists along Armour Road. Armour Road is now a safe corridor that serves all users, incorporates sustainable measures, is visually appealing, and is economically vibrant.



MINOR HOME REPAIR AND HOME MODIFICATION PROGRAM

North Kansas City recently partnered with Northland Neighborhoods, Inc. and Rebuilding Together Kansas City to develop a new NKC Minor Home Repair and Home Modification Program support low- to moderate-income homeowners with needed home repairs. This new program assists homeowners who do not have the financial means to respond to code violations and/or modify their homes to accommodate their mobility and access needs. Safety repairs and modifications can include:

- Modifications to bathrooms and showers
- Replacing or repairing steps, stair railings, and walkways
- Minor home repairs including electrical and plumbing repairs
- HVAC repair/replacements
- Exterior home repairs

APRIL ELECTION

The City of North Kansas City will hold a General Municipal Election on April 2, 2024. Polls will be open at the NKC YMCA from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. This year's election is for one Councilmember from Wards 1, 2, 3, and 4.

Missouri requires voters to present photo identification while voting. Voters can present the following forms of information to cast their ballot:

- A nonexpired Missouri driver or non-driver license;
- A nonexpired military ID, including a veteran's ID card;
- A nonexpired United States passport; or
- Another photo ID issued by the United States or the state of Missouri which is either not expired or expired after the date of the most recent general election.

SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL

In the winter months, City crews monitor weather closely and try to get a jump on approaching storms. They pretreat road surfaces with liquid brine and follow an established route that addresses the hill at North Kansas City Hospital for emergency situations and dangerous hilly routes first, then residential, business, and truck routes. In the residential areas, it is always greatly appreciated if vehicles can be cleared from the streets to allow crews to plow curb to curb.

ARMOUR ROAD EMERGENCY SNOW ROUTE

Armour Road has been declared an Emergency Snow Route. During a declared snow emergency, vehicles are prohibited to park on Armour Road between Fayette and Linn Streets. Whenever the City determines that street conditions will make it necessary to remove snow or ice from the streets, the City will activate the emergency snow route provision. All vehicles must be moved within two hours after the City declares a parking prohibition. Whenever possible, the City will announce the activation of the emergency snow route on its website, Textcaster and social media channels. If in doubt that it may snow or there will be an accumulation of ice, it is advised that you move your vehicle. If any vehicle is parked on either side of Armour Road during a snow or ice event for which an emergency has been declared, the vehicle may be ticketed and towed without further notice.

For special pickups, arrange with Jim's Disposal at 816-221-1932 for an additional fee.

Place containers at curbside/alleyway by 7 a.m. on collection days. Containers should be stored inside or on your side or rear yard next to the house. Empty containers should be removed from curbside/alleyway and stored the evening of pickup.

BULKY ITEMS - FIRST WEDNESDAY OF THE MONTH

Bulky waste includes items such as kitchen appliances, furniture, mattresses, and other large items. Bulky items should be on the curb for pick up by 7 am. Do not place items at the curb earlier than the day before pick-up.

Please note that it is required for all "refrigerated appliances" to have the refrigerant removed before it will be accepted for pickup. In such cases, the owner will need a professional (such as an appliance repair shop), to remove the refrigerant prior to disposal.

Tires, substantial amounts of debris, major remodeling, or clean-up projects, including re-roofing and sheet rock replacement are not accepted. For residents requiring a pickup of more items, call Jim's Disposal at 816-221-1932 to arrange it for a fee of \$25.

CHRISTMAS TREE PICKUP

To be eligible for collection, tress must not have tinsel, lights, or any items not originally part of the tree. Place the tree where you usually place your yard waste. Pickup will be Wednesdays in January: 3, 10, and 17, 2024.


