FILING FOR ELECTED OFFICE

Filing for the April 8, 2025, Municipal Election will begin on December 10, 2024, at 8 a.m. in the City Clerk's office located at City Hall, 2010 Howell Street in North Kansas City and filing will close on December 31, 2024, at 5 p.m. This year's election is for one Councilmember from Wards 1, 2 and 3, and two from Ward 4. The Mayor is elected at large. One



Councilmember seat in Ward 4 is vacant, due to the winning candidate moving out of the city limits. This candidate will only serve a 1 year term.

The following positions are up for election this year:

NKC:	Mayor	4 year term

CITY COUNCIL

Councilmembers must be at least twenty-one years of age prior to taking office, a citizen of the United States, and an inhabitant of the city for one year preceding the election, and a resident of the ward from which he/she is elected six months preceding the election. Councilmembers represent the interests of their constituents and citizens in matters before the City. City Council meetings are held the first and third Tuesdays of each month, and begin at 6 p.m.

MAYOR

The Mayor must be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States and a resident of the city at the time of and for two years preceding the election. The Mayor presides over the City Council. The Mayor does not vote except to break a tie. The Mayor is in overall charge of the affairs of the city, and ensures that the ordinances of the city and the state laws relating to the city are complied with.

CANDIDATE FILING

Anyone interested in running for a City office must present to the City Clerk's office in person to complete Candidacy forms. You should bring a photo ID and there is a \$5 filing fee. If you have any questions, please contact Crystal Doss, City Clerk, at 816-412-7815.





SENIOR REAL ESTATE PROPERTY TAX RELIEF PROGRAM

Clay County seniors are in for some welcome financial relief starting in 2025. The Clay County Senior Real Estate Property Tax Relief Program will open for applications online January 1, 2025. To be eligible for the Senior Real Estate Property Tax Relief program the person must turn or be at least 62 years of age during the calendar year of 2025, they must be a Clay County resident, the home they are claiming must be their primary residence and they must be responsible for payment of the taxes. Those persons with property in a trust must show legal, equitable interest in the property being claimed to take advantage of the relief program.

The County will host several informational sessions through early December 2024, where the public can

learn more and ask questions about the program. These events do not require an appointment and are published on the county website.

Clay County staff will also be hosting nine community application events where staff members will be available to assist the public with the application and enrollment process. These events will be held January 2025, through March 2025, at various locations throughout the County.

TEMPORARY SIGNAGE

Temporary signs and flags might include political signs, for sale signs, yard sale signs, or anything else a resident wishes to communicate. In 2016, the City updated its sign regulations in response to a Supreme Court ruling in order to make our regulations "content neutral." In other words, it does not matter what content is on them.

Temporary signs/flags may or may not require a permit. When temporary signs/flags meet all following requirements, a permit is NOT required:

- They can NOT be placed on public right of way/ streets;
- One residential lot allows no more than three (3);



Each temporary yard sign cannot exceed eight (8) square feet, and ground-mounted signs can be no greater than four (4) feet in height; signs that are attached to a building can be no higher than thirty (30) feet; flags are allowed up to forty (40) square feet and mounted on a building by a removable pole/mounting system, or mounted on a permanent, freestanding pole cannot exceed thirty (30) feet high.

The North Kansas City Fire Department is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week (FPW)—to promote this year's campaign, "Smoke alarms: Make them work for you!"

According to NFPA, smoke alarms reduce the risk of dying in a home fire by more than half (54 percent). Meanwhile, roughly three out of five fire deaths happen in homes with either no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

"Working smoke alarms can make a life-saving difference in a home fire, giving people the time to get out safely," said Joe Bays, Captain of Fire Prevention. "This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign is a great way to remind everyone about these messages and to act on them."

SMOKE ALARMS: MAKE THEM **WORK FOR YOU**

North Kansas City Fire Department offers these essential smoke alarm safety tips and guidelines:

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area (like a hallway), and on each level (including the basement) of the home.
- Make sure smoke alarms meet the needs of all family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

The Be SMART campaign was launched in 2015 to promote responsible gun ownership to reduce child gun deaths. Whether you're a gun owner or you know someone who owns a gun, there is a role for everyone in the conversation around secure gun storage.

Owning a gun is a right and personal decision, but secure storage is a public safety issue. Kids and unsecured guns are a potentially lethal combination. Fortunately, a simple conversation can help keep children out of harm's way. It doesn't need to feel strange or awkward to bring up gun storage. Here are a few sample conversations with your friends, caregivers, and relatives before your child visits that can save lives.

DIFFICULT CONVERSATIONS: ASKING ABOUT SECURE GUN STORAGE

"Before I drop my son off, I just wanted to see if you have pets? Also, do you have firearms in your house? Can you confirm how they are stored? I want to make sure he knows your safety rules."

"Hey, excited the kids are getting together this weekend. I know they've hung out quite a bit, but my daughter has never been to your house so I want to confirm a couple of things: Will an adult be at the house the whole time? Also, I heard a story on the news that made me decide I should always ask this—do you have any firearms, and how are they stored? Do you need me to pick her up, or can you give her a ride home?"

Many unintentional shootings happen in the homes of relatives, friends, or caregivers. It's very possible that some of your family members or close friends have unsecured guns in their homes. It's important to ask each time your child visits, as storage practices and gun ownership may change. Never make assumptions when a child's safety is at stake. It's up to all of us to keep our children safe. For more information or secure gun storage tips, visit besmartforkids.org.

SCHOOL SAFETY TIPS

The safety and security of our schools are paramount concerns for the North Kansas City Police Department. We are committed to working closely with schools, parents, guardians, and students to create safe learning environments where everyone can thrive. Here are some tips to keep your child safe this school year:

- <u>Protecting Privacy</u>: Posting detailed information about your child's school, schedule, or extracurricular activities can inadvertently expose them to potential risks, including identity theft, online predators, or unauthorized access to personal information.
- <u>Communicate Openly</u>: Have open and ongoing conversations with your child about safety, including stranger danger, bullying, and how to respond in emergencies.
- <u>Stay Informed</u>: Stay informed about school events, policies, and safety updates by regularly checking

the school's website, attending parent-teacher meetings, and signing up for alerts and notifications.



- Monitor Online Activity: Monitor your child's online activity and educate them about internet safety, including the risks of cyberbullying, online predators, and sharing personal information online.
- Report Concerns: Encourage your child to report any concerns or suspicious activity to a trusted adult, such as a teacher, school counselor, or law enforcement officer.



FALL LEAF PICKUP

In the fall our city's tree canopy brings us amazing red and gold colors. It also brings us piles and piles of fallen leaves. Fortunately, Public Works provides special assistance with all those leaves! From March to December, leaves and grass clippings can be placed in biodegradable paper bags (which are available at City Hall for the discounted price of 10 for \$2) and put out at the curb for pick up each Wednesday.

From October to December, the city uses a leaf vacuum truck to gather leaves. All you need to do is rake your leaves to the curb, and crews will come by and vacuum them up each week free of charge!

- Be sure that you rake your leaves into the grassy area NEXT TO the sidewalk—not ON the sidewalk!
- Never rake or blow yard waste into the street.

Leaves can clog storm drains and increase the likelihood of flooding. Remember, any debris entering the storm drain is untreated, and deposits directly into rivers, lakes, and streams. These pollutants affect drinking water quality, wildlife, and natural vegetation.









Welcome to the home of North Kansas City's own fiber-optic broadband network. PROPER TRASH, RECYCLING, AND YARD WASTE CONTAINER PLACEMENT

Taking your trash, recycling and yard waste out sounds like a simple task, but did you know there is a right and wrong way to place your solid waste containers? Proper cart placement allows haulers to do their jobs efficiently and keeps sidewalks safe for pedestrians.

DO

Place waste containers on your yard, near the sidewalk, or on your private driveway. If you have difficulty due to a slope near the sidewalk, place your container at the top of the slope or preferably in your driveway on trash and recycling days.

DONT

Place containers on the sidewalk or in the street. Placing obstructions on public sidewalks or in the street is in violation of the Municipal Code.

City staff has sent violation notices to residents that have placed their containers on the sidewalk. If you have any waste service questions or concerns, please call 816-274-6004.





North Kansas City partners with Northland Neighborhoods, Inc. and Rebuilding Together Kansas City to develop a new NKC Minor Home Repair and Home Modification Program support low- to moderateincome homeowners with needed home repairs.

This program assists homeowners who do not have the financial means to respond to code violations and/or modify their homes to accommodate their mobility and access needs.

Safety repairs and modifications can include:

- Modifications to bathrooms and showers
- Replacing or repairing steps, stair railings, and walkways
- Minor home repairs including electrical and plumbing repairs
- HVAC repair/replacements
- Exterior home repairs

SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL

In the winter months, City crews monitor weather closely and try to get a jump on approaching storms. They pretreat road surfaces with liquid brine and follow an established route that addresses the hill at North Kansas City Hospital for emergency situations and dangerous hilly routes first, then residential, business, and truck routes. In the residential areas, it is always greatly appreciated if vehicles can be cleared from the streets to allow crews to plow curb to curb. When shoveling driveways and sidewalks, put the snow on the left side of the drive as this will help prevent the snow from being pushed back into the driveway as the snowplow passes by your driveway.

ARMOUR ROAD EMERGENCY SNOW ROUTE

Armour Road has been declared an Emergency Snow Route. During a declared snow emergency, vehicles are prohibited from parking on Armour Road between Fayette and Linn Streets. Whenever the City determines that street conditions will make it necessary to remove snow or ice from the streets, the City will activate the emergency snow route provision. All vehicles must be moved within two hours after the City declares a parking prohibition. Whenever possible, the City will announce the activation of the emergency snow route on its website, Textcaster and social media channels. If in doubt that it may snow or there will be an accumulation of ice, it is advised that you move your vehicle. If any vehicle is parked on either side of Armour Road during a snow or ice event for which an emergency has been declared, the vehicle may be ticketed and towed without further notice.

WINTER FIRE SAFETY

The Fire Department would like you and your family to remain safe by following these winter fire safety tips:

- Have your furnace checked
- Do not place items near your furnace or water heater
- Check your chimneys and vents
- Test your smoke alarms
- Always cover your fireplace with a screen
- Beware of lit candles
- Beware of space heaters

WINTER CAR CRIME TIPS

The Police Department would like to make your holiday season a safe and secure one by reminding you of some simple tips that can protect your property. Remember to remove items of value from your vehicle. Electronic devices such as cellular phones, GPS, and laptops left in plain view inside your vehicle can entice thieves to target your vehicle.

As temperatures drop, the desire to warm up your vehicle rises. Vehicles equipped with a remote keyless start system are recommended. Leaving a running vehicle unattended with the key in the ignition, not only provides car thieves the opportunity to relieve you of your vehicle, it is also illegal.



WINTER WATER PIPE PREPAREDNESS


Winter is approaching, and with it comes the risk of frozen water meters and pipes, which can cause significant inconvenience and cost to homeowners and businesses. To help avoid these issues, here are a few essential steps you can take:

- <u>Locate Your Water Shutoff Valve</u>: Familiarize yourself with the location of your water shutoff valve so you can act quickly in case of an emergency.
- <u>Insulate Your Pipes</u>: Use insulating foam, insulation, or heat tape to protect your water meter and pipes. These can be found at local hardware stores. Insulate both the pipes inside your residence or business and those in your meter pit.
- <u>Use Straw Bales</u>: Placing straw bales over your meter or against the house where the pipes enter can help reduce the risk of freezing.
- Protect Crawl Spaces: If you have a crawl space, ensure that pipes are wrapped with foam or heat tape, as these areas can get quite cold.
- Keep Under-Sink Doors
 Open: If your walls are thinly insulated, leaving the doors under sinks open will allow warm air to circulate around your plumbing.

 <u>Drip Your Faucets</u>: Allowing a small stream of cold water to drip from your faucets can help prevent the water in your pipes from freezing.

Please remember, if your water lines do freeze, the City will not enter your property to thaw them. For business owners, it is particularly important to note that the City will not thaw out frozen meters. It is your responsibility to take these preventive measures to avoid frozen water meters and service lines, thereby preventing costly plumbing services.

Stay proactive and prepare in advance to keep your water flowing smoothly this winter!
